KITCHEN CAPERS

This is a very simple to make summer sweet which nevertheless is quite special enough to give to guests, particularly if topped with fruit and served with whipped cream.

Orange Mousse

½ pt. concentrated orange squash

1 orange jelly

1 lge. tin evaporated milk

Dissolve the jelly in the squash and leave till on the point of setting. Whisk the evaporated milk till thick and creamy and then whisk in the dissolved jelly. Pour into quite a large dish and leave till set. Decorate to taste.

N.B. This can also be made with lime cordial and a lime jelly or strawberry milk shake syrup (slightly diluted with water) and a strawberry jelly. P.R.
