Hi all and welcome to the latest edition of the Mardle. Slowly but surely we are starting to emerge from our lockdown state. As you would expect, safety is our top priority, and we have a number of precautions in place to manage Covid risks. Note particularly that everyone, including children will need to remain seated and socially distanced whilst they are in the Hall.

It is always the case that you learn a lot about a community when it comes under some pressure, as we have over the last four months. I am impressed by the support that villagers have shown for their neighbours, and the community spirit that has allowed us to carry on as near a normal life as is possible over this period.

To-date we have not heard of anyone in the village succumbing to Covid-19 – due, perhaps, to a combination of good luck and good practices. Keep doing whatever you have been doing.

Having cancelled our last meeting, we went ahead and held our first ever on-line meeting. Thanks to the Clerk for making all the administrative arrangements. It worked very well and we finished the whole agenda in just about an hour – very efficient; the minutes will be on the website soon. We are waiting to hear from you about projects which could benefit from the CIL funds we hold. The Clerk can provide more details for you. Next time, in September, we hope to hold a socially distanced meeting in the Hall.

The B1113 has its new signage to announce the 40mph speed limit through the village. This is the result of a concerted effort by many people over the years, but, a pointed input by Dr Patricia really had the required effect to get NCC Highways to take action.

We are receiving complaints about bonfires. They need to be set only when it is both legal and socially acceptable to do so. For one individual, having the fire brigade visit you and read the riot act does indicate you have overstepped the mark. Similarly, when another's bonfire smoke envelopes the neighbourhood, people's washing and gardens in a dense fog, then you too are not being considerate. SNC have some good advice on their site about the steps to take in order to ensure acceptability and safety – they also have advice on how to complain.

Walking around the village there are two aspects which spoil the walk – one is litter and the other is unkempt hedgerows. Littering is wrong and anti-social; so is walking by. Please consider taking a bag with you on a walk and retrieving a few items. Together we can keep the village clear.

Hedgerows which border a footpath or the road need to be managed. Do take a look at yours and ensure it is not an obstruction, a potential nuisance to passers-by, a danger to cyclists or causing poor visibility to motorists.

There has been a spate of drug taking in the back waters of the village where syringes and other paraphernalia have been discarded. The Police are interested in these matters and would like to hear about them. Do not intervene but record any details (such as time, place, car number plates) for passing to our Engagement Officer, PC Hudson (Andrew.Hudson@norfolk.pnn.police.uk or 01953 425699 Ext 2377)

Finally, there is a free, once in a lifetime, show in the skies to the north-west (after 11.30pm). On a clear night the comet NEOWISE is still visible for the next week or so, as it rushes out of the Solar System to return in 6,800 years' time.

As you would expect, the safety of our staff and customers is our top priority, so there are some rules in place to control Covid risks.

- If you have a temperature, cold or cough or are otherwise unwell please do not join us
- When queuing for fish and chips please observe social distancing and queue away from the car park going up towards the school.
 Only one person at a time should be at the chip van
- A mask should be worn when ordering at the bar.
- Please maintain the optimum social distancing of two metres at all times on the premises
- We will need to record your contact details on entry for track and trace purposes. This data will not be used for any other purpose other than track and trace.
- When you are indoors you should remain seated at all times unless you are ordering. <u>This includes any children in your group.</u>
 Toys including scooters will not be allowed.
- If you are outside you may stand, but please ensure you observe proper social distancing.
- We will operate a one-way system to enter and exit the premises.
- Only one person will be allowed in the toilets at any one time and children must be accompanied.
- Please wash your hands regularly and use the hand sanitiser provided.
- Payments for the bar are contactless, payments for fish and chips are cash and contactless.
- We may have to refuse entry if our maximum capacity is reached. Please be patient with us if we need to do this.
- At the bar please have only one person ordering. You cannot sit at or lean on the bar.

Coffee morning in the village hall is back! By the time The Mardle goes to press we will probably have held our first socially distanced event, on 29th July, and will know how well our return has been received. For everyone's comfort and protection, there will be several changes: we shall convene in the Witch and Wren Bar, where the sliding doors can be kept open, and on the patio. Access will be via the patio entrance, where you will be asked to take advantage of the hand sanitisers provided by the village hall and we will have to restrict numbers so that everyone can be seated on arrival. The toilets adjacent to the bar will be open if needed.

Orders for coffee and other drinks will be taken at table by our small band of helpers and delivered to you there and you will be given a cup/glass which you will retain for refills. Payment will be taken and change given by one member, who will not be serving drinks. All helpers will be masked and will practice frequent hand washing. Biscuits will be available at the table in small packets for you to help yourself and will be free of charge. Sadly, at least for the moment, no bacon rolls!

These arrangements are for the protection of all our visitors and we will try to make the event as relaxed as possible within the guidelines. We hope you will join us for an opportunity to commiserate with one another about the strange turn our lives have taken in recent months and a good old mardle in general. Looking forward to seeing you!

Zumba – Rachel Evans

For the last 9 years I have been running my Zumba classes from Wreningham Village Hall. On March 18th I closed the Hall door for the last time and said a nervous goodbye to my Zumba Family, many of whom have danced with me for years. It was a very sad day indeed.

Over the last 4 months I have reinvented myself as a technical wizard and from just a week after that last class to this day I've run a weekly schedule of 9 Zoom Zumba Classes. In the early days of Lockdown it was an incredible comfort to be able to meet each other and chat about our fears before and after class. It was as much about keeping my students sane as it was keeping them fit and healthy.

I have moved from my lounge into a purpose-built studio in my back garden to offer the very best virtual class experience for my students. It's been a huge learning curve for all of us and I'm so proud of everyone for embracing this new way of exercising. I have been able to dance with students from their 20s to mid 80's! I also have had many Instructors join my classes from as far afield as New Zealand and the USA.

At this moment in time (July) Group Exercise classes are still rather in the wilderness. Loud music is not permitted, students may not sing (heaven forbid) and a class such as Zumba or aerobics which requires travel needs a massive 4 x 4 metre square per person. I will have to operate a booking system where I will take student information for Track and Trace plus we will also have to follow the Protocol of the Hall regarding entrance and exit etc.

Fitness professionals are hoping that by mid Sept the social distancing required is lessened to allow viable classes to begin. European space requirements are half that of the UK.

Keeping everything crossed to get back to the live version of Zumba soon but in the meantime, Zoom Zumba will keep us fit. In the immortal words of Dame Vera Lynn 'We'll meet again'.

Thanks to everyone munching away on crisps, snacks, biscuits, muesli bars, cakes and feeding their furry family, I recently sent to TerraCycle 19Kg of hard to recycle plastic. This brings the total of items saved from landfill to a whopping **21,846** and we have collectively raised **£153.88** for PACT Animal Sanctuary to date. Thanks to your efforts, I am close to sending off yet another box of pet food packaging and one of crisp packets so our total will be even higher.

An additional big thank you for separating your items into the 3 streams (crisp/snack, biscuit/cake and pet food) and for flattening all packets where possible. It made my job so much easier.

Don't forget I also take confectionery packaging, toothbrushes / toothpaste tubes and baby food packaging which I pass on to other collectors.

All Saints, Wreningham

Firstly, I am so sorry that we have had to keep the church locked for so long but at last we are able to open Wreningham church for private prayer. We hope to open each day but it will depend on the ability to clean on a regular basis. Please, do your bit by following the advice provided for both the safety of yourself and others.

The other good news is that the builder has given us a date for the repair to the East Wall. This should be carried out towards the end of September.

It is too early for us to start arranging social events or fund-raising activities but if anybody would like to join in the NCT cycle ride, on 12th September, I would love to hear from you.

The NCT is a grant aiding charity which supports the repairs of historical churches. Over recent years, All Saints, Wreningham, have appreciated the funding which NCT has been able to give to us. In order that they can continue to support churches with grants, they need to raise funds. Their annual sponsored cycle/walk event which involves the whole county has become one of their major fund raisers and always get coverage in the EDP.

The idea is that people who want to take part, get themselves sponsored to visit as many churches as they can or wish to, in the time they can spare on that day. Half the money they raise will go to NCT and the other half will be returned to the church of the sponsored person's choice. So! This gives you the chance to keep up your fitness regime, raise money for your local church and for NCT. So many of you have been walking and cycling recently, let's put all that extra fitness to good use and support the charity which supports the buildings which are our heritage.

Sponsorship forms are available from and need to be returned to me.

Throughout the last 4 months our volunteers have continued to keep the churchyard tidy for which I wish to thank them. My thanks to all those who have supported the plant stall at my gate either by donating plants or buying. To date I have raised about £350.00 which is much needed at this time when the churches have been unable to arrange other events. The plants will be there into the Autumn so you still have a chance to add surplus plants or buy something if you still have a space in the garden. Obituary – Maurice Green

It is with great sadness that I report the death of Maurice Green, a longtime resident of Wreningham.

Born in Portsmouth, he grew up in Duxford with five siblings, four sisters and a brother. Maurice was a practical young man with a preference for metalwork and mechanics over more theoretical subjects. He excelled at sports and became an ABA Eastern Counties boxing champion. He had a variety of jobs, including dairyman, driver, working with thoroughbred race horses, and as a coalman. Maurices' love of horses was central to his life; he was a steward at the racing track in Wreningham.

His passion for horses was shared by Pam. They married in 1967, the next year Nick was born, followed by Darryl in 1973. The Greens stabled their horses at Hill House Farm where they supported Mr & Mrs Peel and eventually inherited the farm. An easy going man with simple tastes, Maurice did not do holidays, he worked hard and enjoyed his dog, a simple life, his family, his horses and, of course, his Massey Ferguson tractor.

He passed away in the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital being treated for cancer. He leaves behind his wife, Pam, his two sons, Nick and Darryl and Nick's partner, Annie. His cremation was held at Breckland Crematorium on 13 May 2020 and following his wishes, his ashes will be scattered across the fields on his farm.
