Parish Council

During the last few weeks there has been a rash of planning applications – all are posted to the village website for inspection and comment. You may advise one of the Councillors of your views which can then be taken into account when we formulate our response to SN Council following debate and agreement.

Goff's Norwich Innovation Centre public consultation will have closed by the time this edition of the Mardle reaches you. Once the formal planning application is made, you'll have a further opportunity to make your views known.

Bonfires – Before you light them, think about your neighbours downwind or laundry during daytime.

Being mobile — as a pedestrian, a runner, a cyclist, a motorist, etc. — in a rural village has its rewards, but an unmanaged / untrimmed hedge can spoil a trip out. Please ensure that your hedges, brambles, branches do not invade someone's space or injure them as they move about the village.

Covid – there is currently no proven vaccine available for this pernicious and debilitating disease. The best practice is that we should maintain social distancing, wash hands regularly and wear face masks. Please be careful out there, this "invisible enemy" is tenacious and can have long-term impact, or worse. We have colder weather coming which will add 'flu to the mix. So, remember to book a 'flu jab.

The PC has purchased a replacement basketball hoop and net (installed by Hughie Glaves) for the playing field and Keith Morris is sourcing new nets for the football goals. Hughie and I used the best part of 1500Kgs of topsoil to fill in numerous rabbit holes and to repair and level the site for the bench nearest the main field entrance. This was then rolled by Noel Course before Hughie applied grass seed.

If you have news to share with other villagers, the Parish Council noticeboards (Penny's Green, The Reading Room, and Top Row) are there

primarily for parishioner use and information. Please get in touch if you would like to place a notice on one or more of these noticeboards.

Do you have a whole village perspective? Is Wreningham as it should be? Become a Parish Councillor and help maintain the village, look for improvements and implement them. We have two Councillor vacancies and would welcome interested and vigorous individuals to help care for the village. Training is available.

All Saints, Wreningham

We're proud to say All Saints, Wreningham has been the only church in this Benefice able to be open every day this Summer. I know this has been appreciated and I thank those who have taken a turn in anti-bac spraying each evening before it is locked. Unfortunately, we are going to have to close it for a few weeks starting on 28th September.

However, the good news is that the builders should be starting work on the east wall that week. Weather permitting, the job will take about 4 weeks. As soon as the job is completed, we will open up again on a daily basis.

During the time that the building work is going on, we'll not be able to make the church porch a collection point for the "Foodbank" so you will find the green crate in my porch and you're welcome to leave your donations there. The porch is unlocked and accessible during the day.

Pews –I have for a long time thought that the pews in Wreningham church ought to be removed. They are full of woodworm, the aisle is too narrow for 2 people to walk side by side and coffin bearers particularly have a problem. The seats themselves are longer than 3 people need, but not long enough for 4 to sit comfortably. If we had chairs, the area would be much more versatile and usable. The past 6 months have been further evidence that taking the pews out should be considered. Social distancing

has meant that we have not been able to hold any kind of service in the church. A family decided to have a graveside funeral rather than use an alternative church and 2 weddings planned for Wreningham had to go to Ashwellthorpe church.

I would like to know if anybody in the village feels strongly, either way, about taking some of the pews out as and when we have the funds or manpower to do this. As the floor needs attention under the choir stalls, I think this would be the first area to concentrate on. So, if we have anybody with basic carpentry skills who could either advise or assist with this project, I would be pleased to hear from you, as well.

Nobody knows what the Winter will bring, whether there will be further lockdown or fear of going out and about. If anybody does feel lonely or depressed, we as a church do have a group of people who try to support the sick or lonely at times of stress so if the present situation starts to affect your health do feel free to contact me or Margaret Styles (the care group leader) on 01508 489112 and we will try to support you.

Recycling News

Great News! Thanks to all your hard work munching on crisps, biscuits and feeding your furry family, I've sent off 33kg of recycling to TerraCycle. Well done everyone, my garage is now empty and ready to receive a top up!



Can I also thank you for sorting your items into the 3 streams, flattening all packaging (especially snack packets) and washing/drying all pet food pouches. It has made my job so much easier, as has the help I've received from Hilary to sort, weigh and box up.

Apart from freeing space, the other good news is that this brings our total raised for PACT to just under £200 which is fantastic in such a short space of time, living through a pandemic and being a relatively small community. To put this in perspective, we have stopped over **30,000** pieces of plastic from landfill which is amazing.

Now that we are returning to work (maybe), can you collect packaging from your office, school or other workplace? Another good source could be care homes. Do you work in one or do you have family there? I know you probably aren't able to visit as you used to but maybe any suitable plastic can be saved for you to collect – my parents' care home certainly went through loads of biscuits and crisps.

TerraCycle has announced 4 new programmes – medicine blister packs, cheese wrappers, household gloves (both reuse and disposable) and makeup recycling. I must stress that I am not collecting for these but if you want to further save plastic from landfill, hang on to your items and I'll keep you informed of where you can take them as more drop off points come on line. At present, there's nothing close by although you can take your empty make up containers to Tesco Harford Bridge.

I recently managed to get Wreningham on the recycling map with an interview on Radio Norfolk. Next month I'm Zooming with Mulbarton Beavers. Wreningham Fuel Trust

The Trust Deed sets out that "The income from Wreningham Fuel Trust has to be given to provide fuel for the poor persons of the parish of Wreningham". This means that the charity income is available to anybody living in the parish who is in need and the application may be made by the needy person or anybody who wishes to nominate a person to receive help towards their fuel bills. The Trust does have a regular income, mainly from interest on money on deposit and It is a requirement of the Trust Deed that all the money received in a year is paid out in the same year. Anybody wanting help can apply at any time of the year and the Trustees will consider each application, in confidence. At these times of uncertainty, if anybody in the village is in need, we would invite you to make an application.

Traditionally, when we have few applicants, the Trust invites our elder parishioners to apply to the fund for consideration for a distribution to take place in January. 
The Last Wednesday Coffee Morning




